Year 1	<p>Treasure Chest: The Sinking of the Titanic</p> <p>6 key question: the focus is on problem-solving skills. Children are encouraged to interpret evidence and reach their own conclusion.</p>	<p>Bonfire Night (1/2 lessons)</p> <p>1 or 2 key questions: focus is on teaching about Bonfire night, Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot. The first lesson is called A moving story. Pupils hear the story of the Gunpowder Plot in different parts of the room before a final role play in the cellar of the Houses of Parliament. Art links</p> <p>Toys old and new</p> <p>6 key question: focus is on looking at concepts such as similarity and difference as well as old and new and change through time.</p>	<p>Moon Zoom Including Neil Armstrong</p> <p>6 key question: the focus is on how astronauts landed on the moon and what evidence is there that this actually happened. What did astronauts do when they landed there and how do we know. The children will also look at Neil Armstrong's great achievement as a significant person in the past to study and the impact his landing had on future flights.</p> <p>Science links</p>			<p>Dinosaurs Including Mary Anning</p> <p>6 key question: the focus is on the work of Mary Anning, a significant a significant young woman achieving an amazing amount in a short time in what was a man's world. Children have an opportunity to work with fossils as Mary Anning discovered.</p>

<p>Year 2</p>	<p>The Great Fire (1/2 lessons) 3 key questions: What started the fire and how we know focussing on cause and consequence.</p> <p>Land ahoy 6 key questions: comparing seaside holidays to today: linked with geography topic features of a seaside town, oceans and continents</p>	<p>Poppy Day (1 lesson) 2 key questions: children are asked to think about what memories are and why do we wear poppies to remember.</p> <p>Polar Express including Scott of the Antarctic 6 key questions: the topic provides great opportunities to look at sequencing and then causes of events: linked with geography hot and cold areas and the equator.</p>	<p>Wright Brothers 6 key questions: this topic helps children to understand how fast the world has changed in the last 100 years. What impact the Wright Brothers have had internationally and reflect on why they were successful when others were not. There is also the option to include Amy Johnson to continue to investigate flight and a significant female engineer.</p>		<p>Castles 6 key questions: focus on what makes a castle and why castles were built. Focussing on Windsor Castle starting with William the Conqueror.</p>
